

The Sisters of Mercy began to visit patients every Sunday soon after they arrived in Athy in 1852, until the Board of Guardians asked the Sisters to take charge of the workhouse infirmary. This they did on 24th October 1873. On 3 April 1969, patients were transferred to the new St Vincent's Hospital

St Vincents, in its various forms, has been serving Athy and county Kildare for over 170 years.

The hospital now primarily provides geriatric care, including a residential

care centre and day-care facilities.

1. Make the sign for the letter 'E' with both hands




2. Move together and apart several times
